ABOUT THIS CONTEST

The Range & Pasture ID Contest will help members learn to identify all the 74 native and introduced grasses which are listed on the Master Plant List for 4-H. The grasses in the grass contest are important for their value in making decisions about the Texas forage resources, their health, and help to determine the change that has occurred on our land base in Texas. Members will also learn how plants grow, grazing impacts on land, grass and plant identification and examination.

The Range Evaluation Contest is the next step after you have learned the grass and plant types! This 4-H contest concentrates on making decisions about the rangeland resource including ecological site health determination, stocking rate, and the use of management tools to benefit the forage, soil, water, and livestock/wildlife resources. The key to success in this contest relies on your ability to identify plants and have knowledge of their ecological and economic value. The 4-H Range Evaluation Contest is conducted totally outdoors.

CONTEST TYPE

Invitational: Counties may enter an <u>unlimited</u> number of teams and up to 2 individuals in the Range & Pasture ID/Range Evaluation contest in each age division.

• Texas 4-H State Roundup will host an Invitational Range & Pasture ID/Range Evaluation contest. All Senior 4-H teams/individuals may participate in the State Invitational contest.

CONTEST STRUCTURE

Team & Individual: Range & Pasture ID/Range Evaluation teams must be comprised of 3-4 youth in the same age division *unless they are a Junior contestant moving up to Intermediate Team. This contest also allows individual competitors. *Please note that only two individuals per age division will be allowed at District. If you have three individuals, they will be required to combine into a team to compete at District.

RANGE & PASTURE ID / RANGE EVALUATION CONTEST RULES

2. Contest Components:

Range & Pasture Grass Identification - Identify and classify 40 to 50 live or mounted grass specimens according to their life span, season of growth, origin, and grazing value for livestock and wildlife. Range Evaluation - Team entry of 3 or 4 members. Contestants identify 20 to 40 range plants; determine use, condition, site and practices for range area; and evaluate four range plots. ABOUT THIS CONTEST

The **Wool & Mohair Judging Contest** tests a 4-H members knowledge and ability to determine the grade, rank, and categorize wool/mohair. The contest provides an opportunity for youth to compete and develop skills that can be used on a sheep/angora ranching operation, within the wool & mohair industry, or agricultural teaching field.

CONTEST TYPE

Invitational: Counties may enter an <u>unlimited</u> number of teams and up to 2 individuals in the Wool & Mohair Judging contest in each age division.

• Texas 4-H State Roundup will host an Invitational Wool & Mohair contest. All Senior 4-H teams/individuals may participate in the State Invitational contest.

CONTEST STRUCTURE

Team & Individual: Wool & Mohair Judging teams must be comprised of 3-4 youth in the same age division *unless they are a Junior contestant moving up to Intermediate Team. This contest also allows individual competitors. *Please note that only two individuals per age division will be allowed at District. If you have three individuals, they will be required to combine into a team to compete at District.

WOOL & MOHAIR JUDGING CONTEST RULES

2. Contest Components:

Wool Judging & Evaluation - Judge two classes of wool and complete an evaluation form on each class. Evaluate 20 fleeces for grade, staple length and yield. REMINDER: District contests for wool and mohair will <u>not be qualifier contests</u> for State Roundup. State Roundup Wool & Mohair judging contests will be open to all Senior teams/individuals.

Mohair Judging & Evaluation - Judge two classes of mohair and complete an evaluation form on each class. Evaluate and grade 20 fleeces. REMINDER: District contests for wool and mohair will <u>not be qualifier contests</u> for State Roundup. State Roundup Wool & Mohair judging contests will be open to all Senior teams/individuals.

ABOUT THIS CONTEST

The **4-H Soil Judging Contest** offers youth an opportunity to get outside and learn about the world around them (see informational video <u>HERE</u>). Contestants will judge four soil profiles with 20-minutes allowed for each and determine the soil characteristics of the profiles and make interpretations based on observation. Objectives for this contest include:

- To teach youth identify different soil types and understand their characteristics.
- To give youth an appreciation for value of soil and its conservation.
- o To help youth understand how soil amendments change soil qualities.
- o To make youth aware of career opportunities related to soil.

CONTEST TYPE

Invitational: Counties may enter an <u>unlimited</u> number of teams and up to 2 individuals in the Soil Judging contest in each age division.

• Texas 4-H State Roundup will host an Invitational Soil Judging contest. All Senior 4-H teams/individuals may participate in the State Invitational contest.

CONTEST STRUCTURE

Team & Individual: Soil Judging teams must be comprised of 3-4 youth in the same age division *unless they are a Junior contestant moving up to Intermediate Team. This contest also allows individual competitors. *Please note that only two individuals per age division will be allowed at District. If you have three individuals, they will be required to combine into a team to compete at District.

5. Contest Components:

Soil Judging - Judge four soil profiles with 20 minutes allowed for each. Determine the soil characteristics of the profiles and make interpretations based on observation. REMINDER: District contest for Soil Judging will <u>not be a qualifier contest</u> for State Roundup. State Roundup Soil Judging contests will be open to all Senior teams/individuals.

6. <u>Transportation:</u> Coaches are responsible for all transportation to and from contest site. Coaches are also required to assist in operation of the contest through the grading of score cards and serving as pit monitors.

- Water bottle and hand towel for soil texturing purposes.
